ST PAULS CARNIVAL 2022: EDUCATION PROGRAMME

This year, we not only delivered 80+ workshops to primary and secondary schools during the 'lead up to carnival programme', resulting in 330 students taking part and performing within our live events – we also rolled out our first 'Black History Package'. This offered Bristol schools a chance to sign up to a package of workshops and assemblies, which included teacher training 'on ways to deliver black history education', cultural awareness sessions, spoken word, poetry and much more. These were fully booked within 2 hours!

Packages offered:

1 x 'Teacher training workshop' - 2 hours This became mandatory attendance training for the entire staff team at each school.

Facilitators: Aisha Thomas, Richad Ferron, Angel Mel and 4 Montpelier High School students

Training for teachers on the delivery of lessons within Black History Month (October), the importance of representation within the curriculum all year round, exploring how to tackle and face uncomfortable conversations with the students surrounding black history and race, and raising awareness of inspirational people of colour around the world (scientists, activists and other academics). These sessions also included student guest speakers sharing their views and giving advice from the perspective of a young person.





Packages offered:

3 x 'The Talk' classroom workshop - 45 minutes/1 hour Facilitator: LaToyah McAllister-Jones

A conversation between a parent and their child. This was a window into motherhood, where a mother shared her hopes and fears for the life experiences of her child of colour.

1 x Guest speaker year group assembly - 30 minutes Facilitator: Lewis Wedlock

Covering lots of topics, including the exploration of an individual's cultural heritage, being a person of colour within different workplaces and sectors, discussions of education opportunities and hearing inspirational people of colour sharing stories of their life journey.

1 x Carnival themed year group assembly - 30 minutes Facilitators: Carole Johnson and Richad Ferron

An assembly full of education on the history of St Pauls Carnival, the Seven Saints of St Pauls and their stories, and learning about the many carnivals around the world.





Packages offered:

1 x Black History themed poetry/spoken word year group assembly - 30 minutes Facilitator: Shakara Thompson

Hearing from some of Bristol's most talented artists using their passion and creativity to write on modern day matters in today's society.

Throughout September, October and November we continued to deliver further assemblies to both primary and secondary schools covering a range of topics, such as:

- The heritage of St Pauls Carnival
- The lives of the 7 saints of St Pauls
- The importance of the exploration of an individual's cultural heritage
- Learning about inspirational people of colour and their life journey

Plus so much more. This year we have been contacted by many Bristol schools asking for support with black history education delivery, and we try to adapt our assemblies and workshops to adhere to the needs and requirements of each individual school.

ST PAULS CARNIVAL 2022: COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Our elders are at the heart of St Pauls Carnival and the community engagement programme is designed to bring them closer to the organisation to help inform how we programme content going forward.

Over the past year, our work has tackled digital isolation, improved wellbeing and documented local stories through a series of focused but connected projects.

Wellbeing & Digital Inclusion

A series of digital training workshops for people aged 55+.

In 2020, the pandemic highlighted how digitally excluded older communities had become. As the world moved towards a digitised way of living, our elders were less equipped to navigate this increasingly online world, which not only made it harder to access support networks but greatly impacted their general mental wellbeing. In response to this, we set out to offer free digital training workshops for elders aged 55+, focusing on the tools most commonly used to stay in contact with friends and family, access vital services and keep in the loop of events happening in the community.





Capture & Preserve

Inna Wi Carnival: Reflections of a Generation

A short film exploring early memories of St Pauls Carnival from local elders.

To better inform the evolution of Carnival it's important we seek counsel from our elders and forebears who paved the way for what we know today as St Pauls Carnival. To capture these stories, we produced a short film which centres around a conversation between local elders. It recalled their memories of St Pauls Carnival from the '60s to the present day, ending with a celebratory group meal and a reflective spoken word piece honouring the legacy of St Pauls Carnival.





Human Libraries

A string of Human Library events platforming a range of local pioneers and community activists.

This project aimed to build awareness of historical facts & discrimination and provide first-hand accounts to people from across the city, to foster engaging conversations, leave lasting impressions and bridge new relationships. Furthermore, it enabled our community to tell hugely important first-hand stories that have a crucial role in shaping future generations and the culture of St Pauls Carnival.

Our Carnival Library event focused on the legacy of the Windrush generation and traditions of St Pauls Carnival. There were six speakers who were chosen because they had a close working relationship with St Pauls Carnival or had experience working on Carnivals around the world.

Alongside the oral storytelling, photos of Carnival were on display around the room and there were handwritten questions spread across tables to encourage conversation.

Hot food was served from Jamaica and Guyana and to round off the night we featured local poet Shakara who performed poems detailing her Caribbean and British experience.

The evening started with a drinks reception, Jamaican canapés and entertainment by children from St Werburgh's Primary School playing the steel pans. Speeches were made by Executive Director LaToyah McAllister-Jones, Asher Craig and Levi Roots.

All three emphasised the importance of Carnival to Bristol both economically and in terms of social cohesion, and that without support from Bristol's businesses Carnival would not happen. The evening finished with Levi auctioning off himself for an evening of cooking and fun, which was won by Darren Evans who owns The Bristol, the Golf Club near Cribbs Causeway.
